






Dedication

We feel that she has been a sincere friend and a devoted teacher. It is our ardent hope that she may have many more happy years at Corry Area High School.






Small consolation where there is none.




Last summer, representing our school in the American Field Service Summer Program, I spent the most rewarding twelve weeks of my life.

I left Corry on June 7, the last day of school, for Montreal, Canada, from which 825 other AFSers sailed on June 9 aboard the Europe-Canada liner, "M. S. Seven Seas." On June 18, we docked in the small Dutch Port of Vlissingen, Holland. From there, twenty-eight of us who were to spend our summer in France traveled by train to Paris, where we spent a week of sightseeing and adjusting to French life. After this gay and exciting week in Paris, we then left for our respective families. I myself went to Pau, which is in Southern France, about forty miles from the Spanish border high in the Pyrenees Mountains, to live with the family of Louis Martinez.

My family consisted of Mama and Papa, my brother, Andre, my three sisters, Maite, Renee, and Michele, and my oldest sister's two children, Jean Pierre and Francoise.

Although I had had no French in school, I managed to communicate pretty well as Andre, Renee, and Michele spoke English, and later on I was able to speak some French. Besides, the love and understanding I received from my family was far deeper than any established by a common language.

During my stay in France, I came to love the French People and their way of life. I believe that the greatest reward I received from the trip was my immediate acceptance as a son and a brother to my family.

In addition to this, I was able to see much of the cultural and scenic beauty of France, including Paris, the Holy Shrine at Lourdes, the Pyrenees Mountains, the Riviera, and the other wonderful places that are so much a part of France.

When it came time to leave, which it did far too soon, I felt very sad not only at the thought of leaving my wonderful family to whom I had grown so attached, but I also felt the very special sadness of parting that comes only when leaving "La Belle, France."

The last leg of my trip took place aboard the Holland-America liner, the "Waterman," where we were all reunited to talk over all our adventures until landing in New York on August 24.

Thus, I would like to once again thank the AFS for affording me this wonderful opportunity, and express to you the pride that I have felt in representing a school as fine as Corry Area High.



From the nine juniors who applied for consideration, six were chosen by the Selection Committee, and their applications were sent to the New York Office of the AFS for the final selection. They were: Michael Johnson, Loretta Lindstrom, Roger Myers, John Ortner, Arthur Tarbell, and Kathe Tunnell. The Selection Committee included: Miss Ruth Bennett, Miss Kathleen Gage, Mr. Roger Hoover, Mrs. Lydia Kapteina, Miss Jeanne Nichols, Mrs. Minna Stahl, Miss Nelle Titus, Mr. J. Donald Watson, and Mr. Harold G. Wolfe.

Applicants for this program must have completed two years of a foreign language, be sixteen years old by June 30, 1961, in excellent health, and a United States citizen. General qualifications are: (1) Ability to adapt quickly and easily to different people and situations; (2) Human understanding; (3) Outgoing personality, curiosity, and interest; (4) Scholastic ability; (5) Recognition of responsibilities and purposes involved in the AFS program, and clear understanding of its aims; (6) A real desire to participate wholeheartedly in this program.

These six students are all capable and could do a fine job representing our school, community, and country. However, only one may be chosen, and that decision will be made by the officials in the New York Office of the American Field Service.

Season's Summary: The Corry Beavers lost a 13-7 heartbreaker to the Warren Dragons with less than one minute to play on a 38-yard pass and run play. Joe Baressi's 51-yard scamper for a touchdown was the outstanding offensive play of the day.

The Beavers won their first game of the season by trouncing the Oil City Oilers 31-6. Four pass interceptions highlighted the defensive work of the Orange and Black. Steve Olson completed four out of eight passes and the Beavers led the Oilers by three touchdowns at halftime. Baressi scored on a 75-yard run and Ray Mitchell was outstanding on defense.

The Beavers bombed the Johnsonburg Ramblers behind the explosive shots of Joe Baressi and the running of Bob Roden. The 25-6 win was an exact reversal of last year's score.

Corry met Franklin's Knights in a "do-or-die" game at the latter's field and lost to a very good Franklin team by a score of 27-6. This victory practically clinched the Knight's second consecutive championship. They shared the 1958 title with Corry and Warren.

Twenty big points in the fourth quarter featured the Beaver's come-from-behind victory over the Bradford Owls. Bill Lord scored the Beaver's first touchdown on the first offensive play by streaking 81 yards. Baressi scored two touchdowns and Olson passed to Harold Wade for the fourth Beaver score of the evening.

Corry's victory over arch-rival Titusville was a methodical success. Scoring seven points in each quarter the Orange and Black defeated the Rockets by a score of 28-0 before the largest turnout at Howard Sheen Field. Roden and Lord accounted for all four touchdowns.

Corry's hard-hitting defense and explosive attack combined to ambush Kane and account for the latter's lone defeat of the season. It was, by far, the outstanding performance by the Beavers in their 1960 season. Steve Olson scored two touchdowns and passed for a third in a sparkling exhibition of football talent. Rugged Harold Wade and Olson lead the Beavers on defense. It was a great team effort.

The Beavers won their fourth home game in a row by defeating Erie East, 16-12. Bob Roden's vicious ground game was the determining factor in the hard-fought game. Lord tallied both touchdowns for the Beavers.

The Orange and Black wound up their 1960 season in a 26-26 tie with the Meadville Bulldogs on a rain-drenched field. Joe Baressi scored four touchdowns in the season finale.
