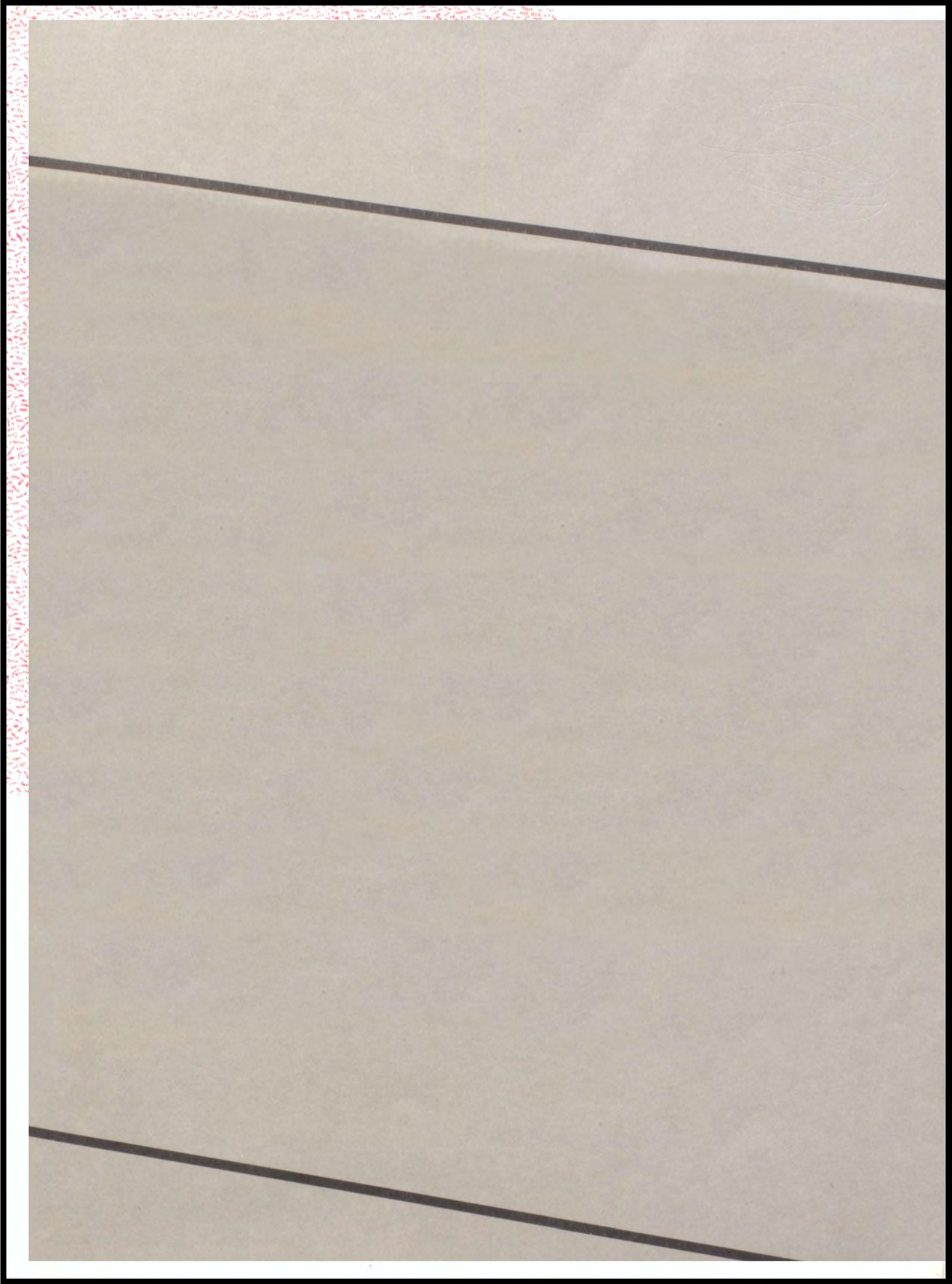

Moving Through Our Days

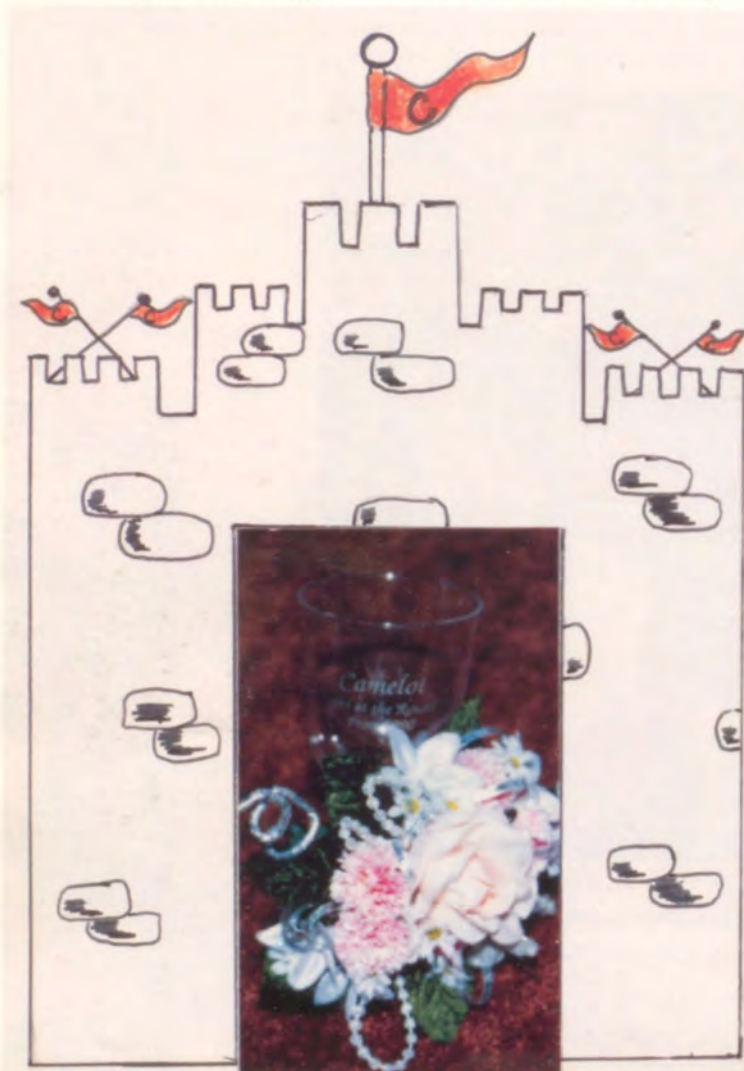

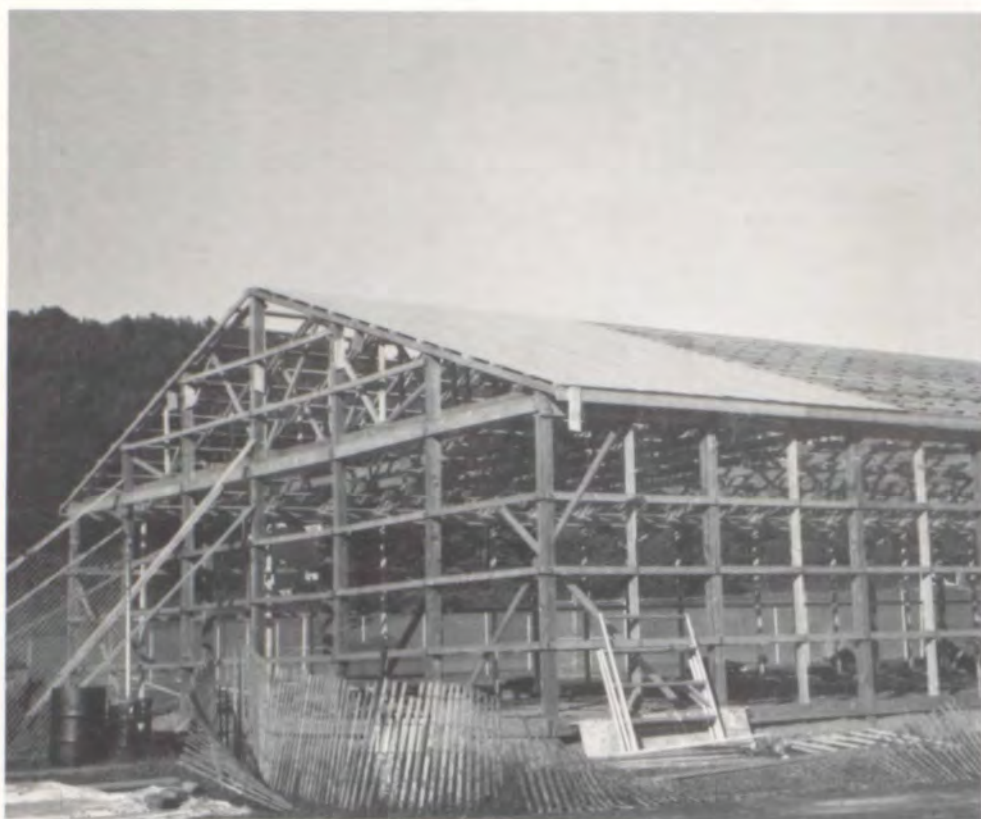




Out In The Backyard Tool Shed!!

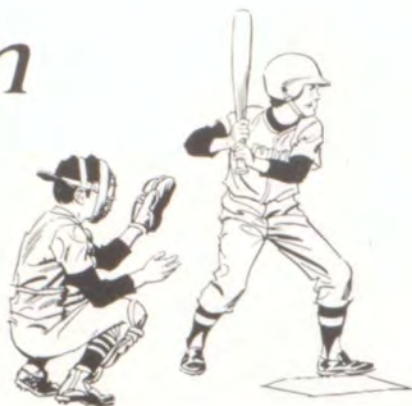

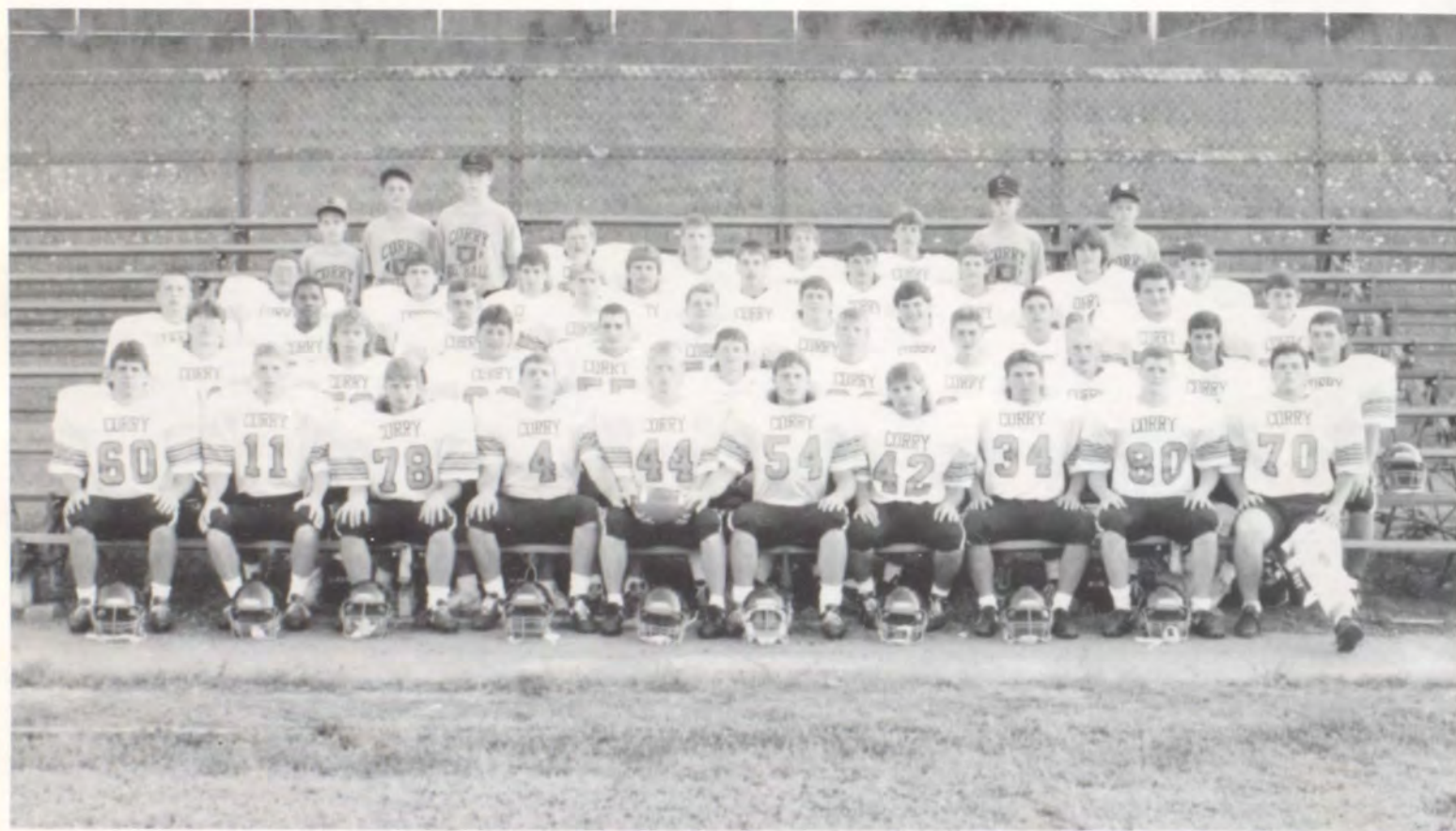

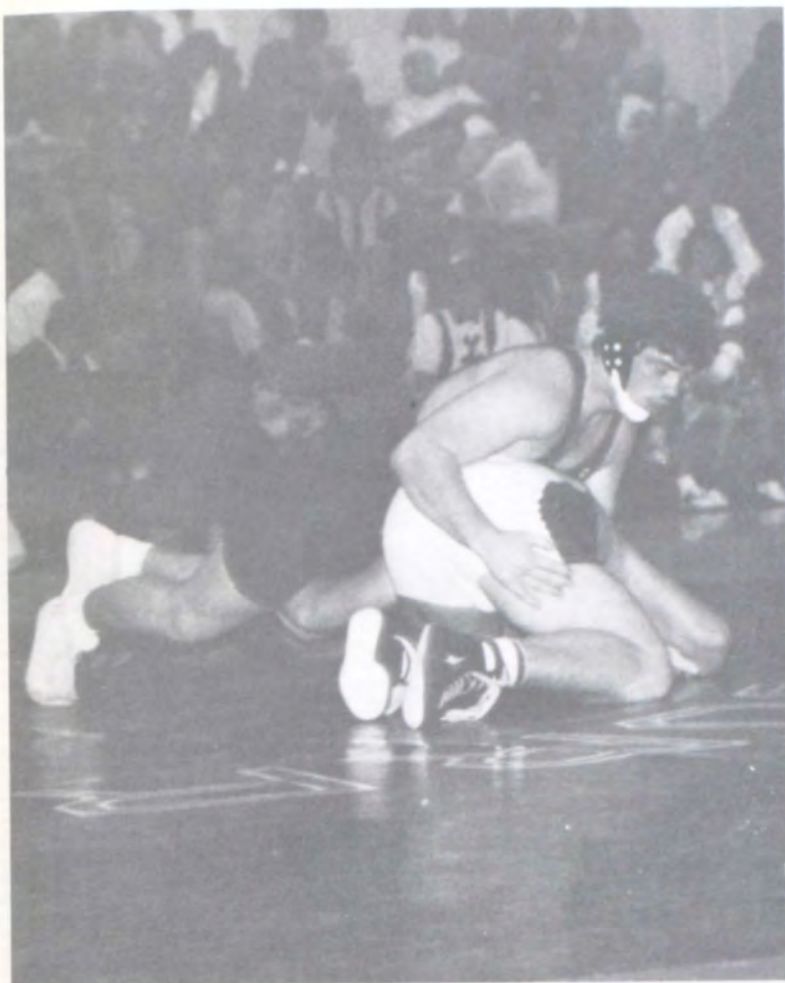

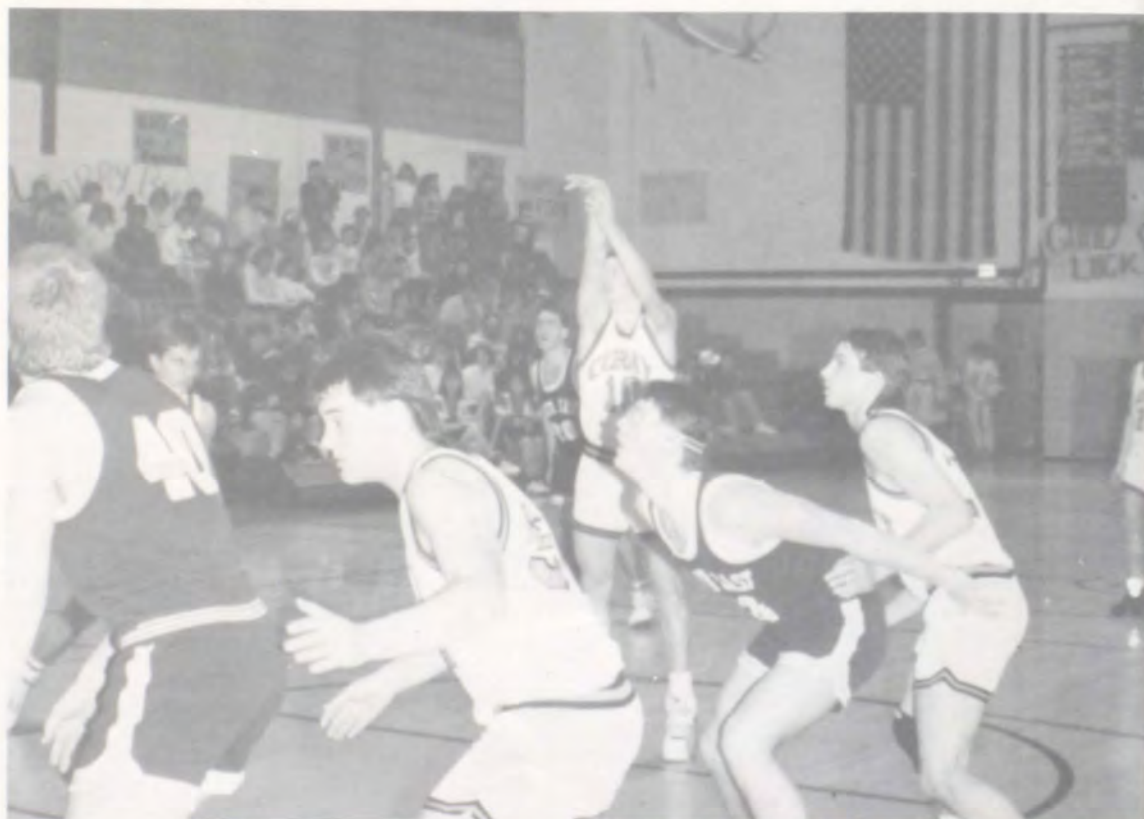

Swimmers Take 8th In Counties And Tony Knapp Wins States.

After two opening losses to Cathedral Prep and McDowell, Corry bounced back with thirteen straight wins under the leadership of senior captains Tony Knapp and Tim Correll to end the season at 13-2 overall. The Beavers won their eighth consecutive Erie County League title with a 10-0 ECL record.

Team highlights included their sixth straight Iroquois Invitational Championship, taking second place at the District 10 meet; and a revenge victory over Cathedral Prep at home.

Tony Knapp led an assault on the record books by the Beavers as he established four individual marks during the season. He took down school standards in the 160 yd. individual medley (1:35.30), the 100 yd. breaststroke (1:03.76), the 50 yd. freestyle (21.69), and the 100 yd. freestyle (47.02).

WELDING

The goal of welding is to teach basic learning experience as a general industrial curriculum designed to prepare a metalworker capable of fabrication and assembling a variety of products in metal-working occupations including machining, welding, sheet and plate metals.

Instruction includes planning, layout, setting up and operating fabricating machines in the manufacturing and assembling of metal products and structures. A variety of metals are formed, shaped, cut, twisted, bent, pressed, fused, marked, aligned, fitted, welded, or otherwise worked upon.
