Policy on gifts and gratuities

While residents, clients and family members often wish to show their appreciation for the care and services rendered by St. Paul's staff, St. Paul's must ensure that residents, clients and family members do not feel obligated to give St. Paul's or its staff gifts or gratuities in order to assure a resident or client receives quality care. In order to comply with this policy St. Paul's has set forth the following quidelines:

- 1. Employees may not ask or suggest that a resident or client, or any person acting on behalf of a resident or client should offer or give gifts or gratuities to St. Paul's staff.
- 2. Employees may not accept cash or currency of any kind, including but not limited to tips from any source or individual. Employee bonuses and/or gifts provided by St. Paul's do not constitute gifts or gratuities.
- 3. Employees may only accept non-cash gifts that do not exceed \$10.00, and/or are shared by the whole staff. In order to be considered a non-cash gift, the gift cannot be converted to currency.

Opportunities for Gifts of Appreciation to Staff

Many residents, clients and families often ask how they can give back and say "Thank You" to the staff who have provided excellent care to their loved ones while living at St. Paul's. These three funds give you the opportunity to do so:

- A donation may be made to the Staff
 Appreciation Fund. This fund enables St. Paul's
 to recognize all staff. (i.e., to provide staff
 apparel, staff appreciation picnics, or gift cards
 for various occasions.)
- 2. A donation can be made to the Staff Education Fund. You can define the education opportunity or leave it to the administrator's discretion.
- 3. A donation of appreciation can be made to the Annual Staff Christmas Celebration. This donation can be given to the administrator or director and identified for the Staff Christmas Celebration and will be used to offset the cost and for staff gifts the night of the party.

If you would like to make a donation to staff for anything outside of these three funds, please see your administrator or director to talk about specifics.

Employees may not accept individual gifts, cash or currency of any kind from a resident or family member. We appreciate your support of these guidelines in order for us to remain compliant with regulations and our corporate compliance policies.

Spiritual Services

Message from Pastor Julia

Across the Lenten season, we looked during weekly Bible Studies and Sunday sermons at some of the places that were significant across Jesus' earthly ministry—and what we can learn from them about a life of faith more broadly. We looked at a mountain in the Judean desert which was a site for Jesus of both retreat and temptation. We looked at the region of Galilee with its many small towns and villages where Jesus made his home. generally felt welcome, and worked lots of miracles. We looked at the Sea of Galilee and the way in which Jesus' proximity to water made his ministry simultaneously connective and profound. We looked at Samaria, an outlier area that many looked down upon, and how Jesus traveled through it oblivious to its reputation, ready to make friends and share the good news. And, finally, we looked at the city of Jerusalem which was a holy destination for Jesus life-long and also, ultimately, the place where he gave up his life for the world.

In all these diverse locales, we see God leading his Son to and through them; protecting and using Jesus well while in them; and extending a promise to work for good in the lives of all people everywhere. This Lenten study about the places that were significant to Jesus reminds me of his continued care for the places that matter to you and me and his desire to be a blessed presence in each one.




