

Pet owners who wish to have their pets visit any building on campus, please see The Villas receptionist between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to pick up a revised policy and sign a new, revised contract.

#### Thank you!

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age.
   Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

### **Guest Apartment at**The Heritage Available




The guest apartment in The Heritage is available to rent to families or loved ones who need a place to stay while visiting.



# Spiritual Services

### **Message from Pastor Julia**

Psalm 113:3 says, "From the rising of the sun to its setting the name of the LORD is to be praised!" It's a great verse to contemplate and obey all across a given year, but, especially, it seems to me, in the summer when there is so much light, so much sunshine, so much brightness in which to do so.

A quick study of this verse reveals much for contemplation. Some translations of Psalm 113:3 understand the opening word "From" to be about timing: the New Life Version is one of these and reads, "The name of the Lord is to be praised from the time the sun rises to when it sets." Other translations understand "From" to be about location, like the New Living Translation reading, "Everywhere—from east to west—praise the name of the Lord." Taken together, they suggest to God's people that we continuously and broadly praise his name. Some translations of this verse understand God's worthiness as the reason behind our praise: the New English Translation is one of these, reading, "The Lord's name is deserving of praise." Other translations, like the Message, understand the reason as being more about us, reading, "Just to remember GOD is a blessing— now and tomorrow and always." Taken together, they suggest God's people should praise him and find fulfillment in life by doing so. In this season of light, sunshine, and brightness, let us contemplate this beautiful verse and obey it throughout each day.



Thank you so much to everyone who has made a donation to the St. Paul's Good Samaritan Fund this year. A total of **\$113,853** has been raised so far! The Good Samaritan Fund is so important as it ensures a resident never has to leave St. Paul's or adjust the level of care they receive because they have exhausted their financial resources. The Good Samaritan Fund is supported through donations to the annual Good Samaritan Appeal, PA OH Gives Giving Week, and St. Paul's Sporting Clay Shoot.

Your support is greatly needed and appreciated as last year, St. Paul's provided more than \$5.2 million in unfunded and benevolent care to residents in need. This is 59% of the residents in skilled nursing and 10% in personal care at St. Paul's. With the rising cost of inflation, this number continues to increase.

The Good Samaritan Appeal is an annual mailing sent out in the spring. A total of 236 individuals made a gift in response to the appeal this year raising **\$72,772**. The highest amount raised to date!

The 4th annual PA OH Gives Giving Week event was hosted through the Community Foundation of Western PA and Eastern OH, June 17-23. During Giving Week, St. Paul's received \$41,081 for the Good Samaritan Fund. 

Thiel College and the Thiel College Blue-Gold Club are delighted to welcome Cuyler (Butch) Berwanger whose father, John Jacob (Jay) Berwanger, was the first recipient of the Heisman Trophy in 1935. Join us for this rare opportunity to hear the stories and insights about the man who blazed a path and left an imprint for all to follow.

### **About the Program**

Jay Berwanger was born in 1914 and grew up in Dubuque, Iowa. He attended Marshall Elementary School, Jefferson Junior High, and Dubuque High School where he played football, wrestled, and ran track.

After high school, he attended the University of Chicago and was the star halfback, safety, punter, and field goal kicker at University of Chicago. He was known as the "one man football team." During a game against the Michigan Wolverines in 1934, he left his mark on Michigan center Gerald Ford in the form of a distinctive scar on the future U.S. President's left cheek. He also competed in track and field for Chicago, setting a school decathlon record in 1936 that stood until 2007.

In 1935, Berwanger became the first winner of the Downtown Athletic Club Trophy. The following year the award was renamed the Heisman Trophy. In 1936, Berwanger became the first player to be drafted by the NFL in its inaugural draft.

#### About the Speaker

Butch Berwanger, of Downers Grove, Ill., is the son of Heisman Trophy winner Jay Berwanger. He was raised in Hinsdale, Ill. and graduated from Denison University. He began his career in education teaching science at L.J. Hauser Junior High in 1969. During his tenure, he added a sports program, student government, a drugand violence-awareness group for seventh and eighth graders and served as the school's guidance counselor. He retired in 2006 following 37 years of service.
