St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy has recently been revised (see below).

Pet owners who wish to have their pets visit any building on campus, please see The Villas receptionist between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to pick up a revised policy and sign a new, revised contract.

Thank you!

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age. Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

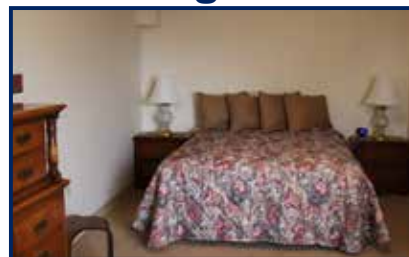

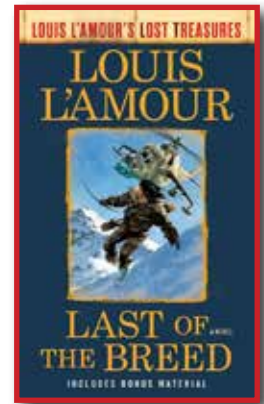

Team Member Spotlight

Pam Brown was born in Waynesburg, Pa., and moved to the Reynolds area with her three younger brothers when she was just six years old. The move was prompted by her father's work as an operations engineer to build the causeway and clear farmland that would later become Shenango Lake.

Following graduation from Reynolds High School, Pam traveled extensively through the United States, Puerto Rico, Mexico and the Bahamas. She also did a lot of fishing in the Outer Banks.

Pam recalls that she's always had a job of some sort. Over the years, she worked at places like the Alley Cat, Cianci's, and the Good Shepherd Center, just to name a few. Later, she joined St. Paul's as a nurse aide, working in the memory support neighborhood. Her passion for caregiving led her to enroll at Thiel College, where she began pursuing a degree in nursing and psychology, with a minor in sociology.

After her first year at Thiel, Pam decided to switch her focus to education in hopes of maintaining a more stable schedule while raising her three young children. Life took another turn, however, and she ultimately graduated with a degree in psychology.

Her first full-time job following college was as the business editor for *The Record Argus*. She then transitioned to what would be a long and rewarding career as a behavior therapist. She worked in a variety of settings, including foster care case management, counseling, and child guidance programs.

A proud mother of two daughters, one son and one step-son, and grandmother to nine including three

One special moment was reconnecting with Betty Grasso, her high school principal's secretary, now a resident of St. Paul's.

Pam appreciates the variety her role offers—from meal preparation and linen changes to light housekeeping, shopping, and even providing hands-on care. She values not only the memories her clients share but also the new memories they create together.

In her free time, Pam enjoys spending time with her husband on their cabin cruiser on Lake Erie or with her grandchildren. She also loves gardening, riding 4-wheelers, and cooking. When asked about her dream vacation, she shared that she'd love to visit the Great Barrier Reef in Australia.

One particularly memorable adventure was a trip to Scotland in 2022, where she met friends she had connected with online during the COVID-19 pandemic. One member of the group is a Scottish folk singer. The group had met virtually twice a week throughout the pandemic, and when restrictions lifted, over 140 people from around the world gathered in Inverness to meet in person. They plan to reunite again this year, though the group is now smaller, and they're also planning a spring break cruise in January.

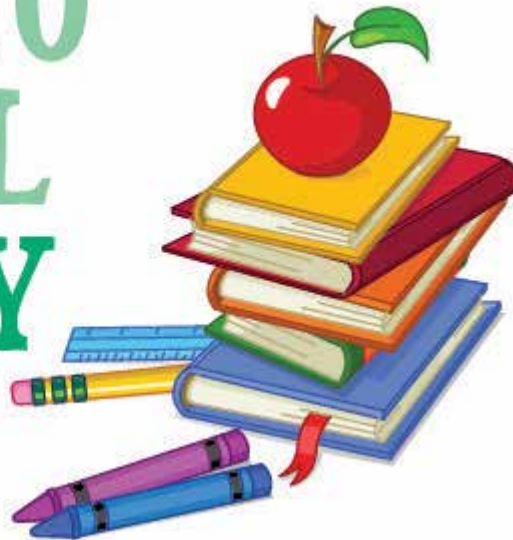
The Gardens Family Picnic at The Villas
