

The Bistro Reimagined: A New Gathering Place Coming in 2026

We are pleased to share exciting news about an upcoming renovation that will transform a familiar space into something new and vibrant for our community. The Bistro Reimagined is a thoughtfully designed project that will bring together the current Bistro and the staff cafeteria (located in The Heritage) into one large, multi-purpose gathering place for residents and staff alike.

When completed, the new Bistro will offer much more than dining. The reimagined space will feature food and beverages, gifts and sundries, a library, and a dedicated game area—including the much-loved pool table—creating a welcoming environment for connection, relaxation, and enjoyment.

Important Dates and Upcoming Transitions

- December 31 was the final day of operation for the Bistro and the staff cafeteria.
- January 1: Staff is invited to dine alongside residents within the neighborhood dining areas.
- January 2–5: Furnishings will be removed in preparation for renovation.
- January 6: Renovation work officially begins.

What to Expect During Renovation

Several accommodations have been planned to minimize disruption during construction:

- The library will be temporarily relocated to the lounge behind the Country Kitchen in The Heritage.
- The hallway between The Villas and The Heritage will remain open, allowing Heritage residents continued access to their mailboxes.
- Any temporary closures of the main hall will be clearly communicated to residents and staff in advance.

Renovations are expected to take approximately four months. Should there be any changes to the timeline, timely updates will be shared.

Dining Options for Staff

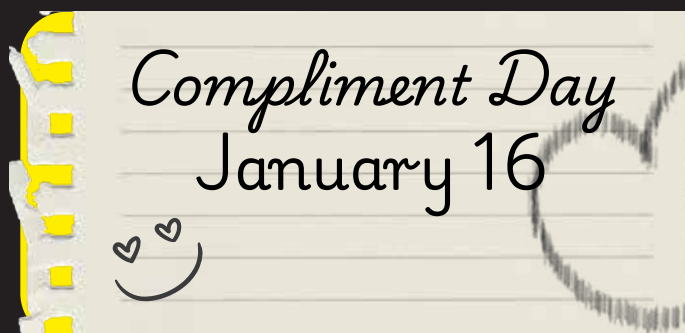
During the renovation period, staff will have the option to purchase food and beverages in The Orchards neighborhood. Additional details, including hours of operation, will be communicated separately.

Policy on gifts and gratuities

While residents, clients and family members often wish to show their appreciation for the care and services rendered by St. Paul's staff, St. Paul's must ensure that residents, clients and family members do not feel obligated to give St. Paul's or its staff gifts or gratuities in order to assure a resident or client receives quality care. In order to comply with this policy St. Paul's has set forth the following guidelines:

1. Employees may not ask or suggest that a resident or client, or any person acting on behalf of a resident or client should offer or give gifts or gratuities to St. Paul's staff.
2. Employees may not accept cash or currency of any kind, including but not limited to tips from any source or individual. Employee bonuses and/or gifts provided by St. Paul's do not constitute gifts or gratuities.
3. Employees may only accept non-cash gifts that do not exceed \$10.00, and/or are shared by the whole staff. In order to be considered a non-cash gift, the gift cannot be converted to currency.

Opportunities for Gifts of Appreciation to Staff

Many residents, clients and families often ask how they can give back and say "Thank You" to the staff who have provided excellent care to their loved ones while living at St. Paul's. These two funds give you the opportunity to do so:

1. A donation may be made to the Staff Appreciation Fund. This fund enables St. Paul's to recognize all staff. (i.e., to provide staff apparel, staff appreciation picnics, or gift cards for various occasions.)
2. A donation can be made to the Staff Education Fund. This fund helps St. Paul's offer various educational opportunities to grow and develop team members' skills

If you would like to make a donation to staff for anything outside of these two funds, please see your administrator or director to talk about specifics.

Employees may not accept individual gifts, cash or currency of any kind from a resident or family member. We appreciate your support of these guidelines in order for us to remain compliant with regulations and our corporate compliance policies.

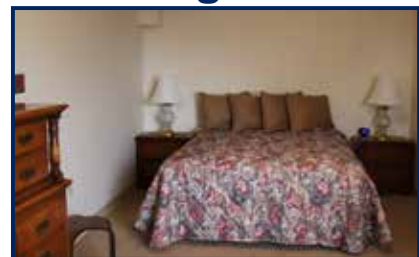

A Message from Chaplain Pat

Where Does the Church Money Go??

The New Year is upon us, a time when many of us plan ahead and set intentions for how we use our resources of time, talent, and treasure. Winter is also a season well suited for continued Advent reflection, making it a natural moment to do just that.

This is the time of year when I share the culmination of our annual charitable giving, overseen by the resident Spiritual Council, which governs the tithes and donations received through our church offerings. Forty percent of all collected funds are given to St. Paul's, which administers and manages the account. The remaining 60% is donated primarily to local organizations in Greenville and Mercer County.

Our Spiritual Council is made up of residents from every area of our community—The Heritage, The Villas, The Ridgewood, and The Colony—and meets quarterly in February, May, August, and November. If this is something you are interested in participating in, please reach out and let me know.

Below is the breakdown of our charitable giving for the year: The funds collected during the first two quarters were intentionally held and then distributed during PA/OH Gives Giving Week in June so that our donations would be matched by the Community Foundation of Western PA & Eastern OH. During this initiative, we donated:

- \$600 to The Good Shepherd Center for their Food Pantry, allowing them to provide food to Greenville residents in need
- \$600 to Hunters Sharing the Harvest, which offsets processing costs so hunters who donate game to food banks incur no expense
- \$600 to St. Paul's Good Samaritan Fund, ensuring that any resident who outlives their resources will never have to move
- \$600 to Shoe Our Children, which provides a new pair of shoes to every qualifying pre-K through 12th-grade child in Mercer County

In addition, though not part of PA/OH Gives, another donation with matching funds was made: \$700 to the It's All About Heart Campaign, which helps enhance the lives of St. Paul's residents by providing meaningful and enriching activities. In total, our \$3,100 in donations was doubled through these matching initiatives.

In August, the Council decided to support The Good Shepherd Center Food Pantry and St. Paul's Alzheimer's Association Team, recognizing many of our residents are affected by Alzheimer's disease and dementia. Each organization received \$400.

In November, a season when gratitude is especially present, the Council again emphasized the importance of feeding our local community. Donations were made to The Good Shepherd Center and the Mercer County Food Bank, with each receiving \$400.

The total amount of charitable giving for the year was \$4,700—well done! If you ever have questions about our church funds or donations, please do not hesitate to reach out to me.

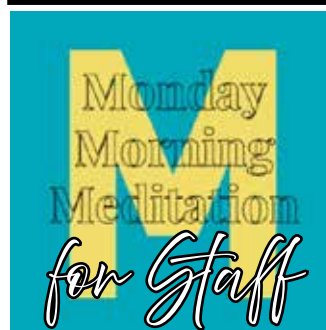

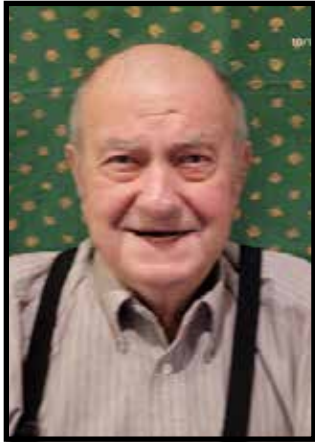

After graduating from Penn High School in Greenville, Don began building a life rooted in dedication and service.

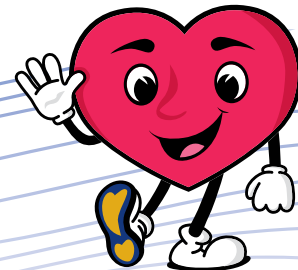

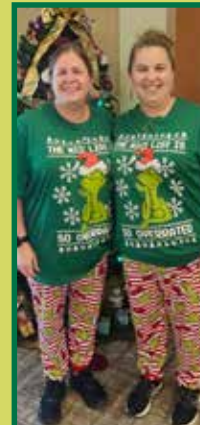

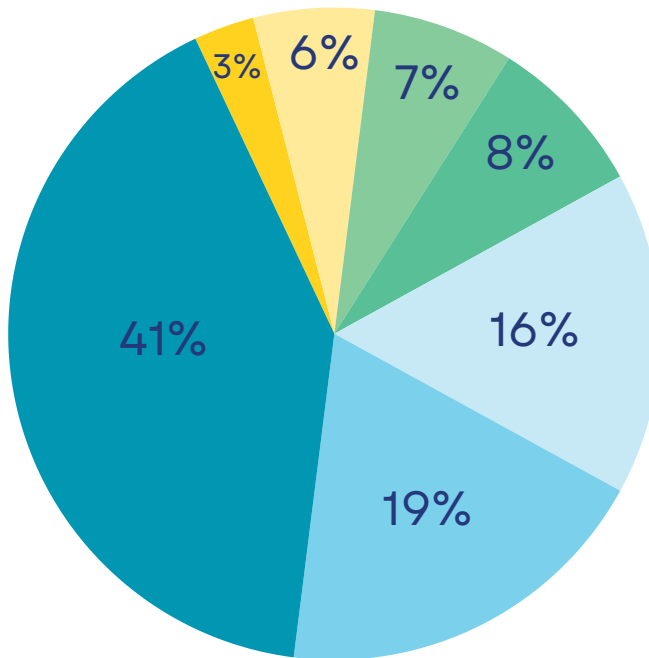
