St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy has recently been revised (see below).

Pet owners who wish to have their pets visit any building on campus, please see The Villas receptionist between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to pick up a revised policy and sign a new, revised contract.

Thank you!

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age.
 Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

A Message from Chaplain Pat

In the process of my moving, packing and unpacking, choosing what to keep and what no longer serves me, I found a small booklet called "The Beautiful in Life," with assorted short writings from various authors on topics such as love, gratitude, kindness, etc. One is from Wm. Henry Channing (an author I was unaware of) called "Awareness" which says, "To live content with small means.

To seek elegance rather than luxury, and refinement rather than fashion.

To be worthy, not respectable, and wealthy, not rich.

To study hard, think quietly, talk gently, act frankly.

To listen to stars and birds, to babes and sages, with open heart.

To bear all cheerfully, do all bravely, await occasion, hurry never.

In a word, to let the spiritual, unbidden and unconscious grow up through the common.

This is to be my symphony."

There are ancient Eastern riddles called Koans which are meant like the parables of Jesus to bump us out of our thinking/doing as usual; to ponder another way, see another perspective which hopefully leads to different actions and less reaction. If we take the time and ponder each statement describing 'Awareness' shared by our author, they are giving me much to ponder, much like a parable or a koan where the answer is not readily at hand. The result is different for my colleague or neighbor.

As I contemplate yet again all of the changes involved with moving, a question that came up for me is "Is it (change) easier or different if we can recognize whether we are moving FROM something or moving TOWARD something?" I believe it can be, especially if we practice living into the questions of life. I'd love to hear how the spiritual is growing up through the common for you as well.



Bob Boyd's Restoration Journey

At The Heritage, every resident has a story to tell. For Robert "Bob" Boyd, that story comes with the smell of oil, the shine of polished chrome, and a lifetime spent bringing old cars back to life.

Bob's love for antique automobiles began during his time in the Navy, when a buddy purchased an old car and planted the idea that he should find one of his own. The two of them would search for antique cars whenever they got together, until one day in 1964 Bob discovered the car that would change everything—a 1917 Ford Model T for sale in Clintonville. He bought it for \$265 and spent the following year restoring it himself. That Model T became much more than a car; it was a piece of history and the vehicle that set him on a path of restoration that would last a lifetime. Though he sold it years later, he still calls it his favorite, the one that meant the most.

What started with that Model T turned into a passion that spanned decades. Bob went on to restore more than 60 antique and classic cars, each with its own story. He and his wife loved to take them on the road, often traveling 50 miles to Clarion for car shows or making annual trips to Conneaut Lake Park for the Chrysler and American Motors picnics.

Among the many vehicles he restored was a 1929 Model A roadster, which he personalized with a Pymatuning Lake plate he had admired in his son-in-law's shed. Small touches like that made each car unique and tied them to moments and places in Bob's life.

Bob did all of his restoration work himself, pouring meticulous care into every car. He treasures the memories each car carries, recalling that "whenever you restore it, you become attached to it." He often reflects on the Model T, saying, "I had that Model T for 60 some years. I love that old car... I said that's the only way to fly, driving that Model T Ford."

When asked what advice he would give to someone starting out in antique car restoration, Bob simply said, "It's not choosing the one you'd like to have—it's the one you find. They're pretty hard to find. You can restore it and sell it until you find the one you like."

Bob Boyd's story reminds us that antique cars are more than shiny showpieces. They are pieces of history, connections to community, and vessels of countless memories. Through his lifetime of restoration, Bob has kept that history alive, and his passion continues to inspire all of us.
