Artwork on Display: Julia Moyer Showcases Her Talent in The Gathering Place in The Keifer Building



Visitors to The Gathering Place in The Keifer Building are welcomed this season by the inspiring artwork of Julia, a Personal Care Aide at St. Paul's. Julia is a visual artist who works in a realistic style, exploring many mediums including charcoal, graphite, watercolor, acrylics, and photography. Her portraits reflect a careful attention to detail, while her photography celebrates the beauty of the natural world around her home—capturing vivid images of insects, fungi, flowers, and hummingbirds.

Julia's work has been recognized throughout the region, with pieces exhibited at local fairs, group shows, and galleries including the Meadville Council of the Arts' Heeschen Gallery and the Hoyt Gallery in New Castle. Out of more than 400 entries, her work was chosen as one of seventy to be displayed in the Hoyt Gallery's 2024 Regional Show, and she has received both "Best of Show" and "People's Choice" awards. Currently, Julia is also participating in the Greenville Public Library's "Tiny Art Show," on display through

August. She is also an active member of Paint Pals, a group in The Colony that gathers monthly for artists to meet, share ideas, and create together.

At St. Paul's, Julia brings the same dedication and creativity she demonstrates in her art to her work with residents. She exemplifies our core values of Compassion, Person-Centered Care, Respect, and Security—qualities she displays daily in the support she provides to our residents.

The Gathering Place was designed as a space to highlight the many talents of both residents and team members, with artwork rotating quarterly. Julia's exhibit is a shining example of how creativity, care, and community come together at St. Paul's.

St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy has recently been revised (see below).

Pet owners who wish to have their pets visit any building on campus, please see The Villas receptionist between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to pick up a revised policy and sign a new, revised contract.

Thank you!

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age.
 Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

A Message from Chaplain Pat

Every Sunday in all three of our Worship Services, we offer a Prayer of Confession as the collective community of the church, for those things we have done and those we have failed to do. It is meant to be a powerful prayer both individually and collectively for us to re-orient ourselves and our actions back toward God to be more in alignment with God's will for the World.

In our troubling times here in America, if we as the church need a beacon or even a sliver of hope, one arrived in a roundabout way. Not as a BIG sign or an event of WONDER, but a seemingly low-key exercise with some meaningful and inspiring results. Not from down the road or across our country, but from halfway around the world through the American native, now the new Pope of the Roman Catholic church, Pope Leo XIV.

In the summer vacation place of Castel Gandolfo, Italy, Pope Leo celebrated a Mass for over 110 people, while he was vacationing, then invited the attendees into the Vatican's lakeside estate for a meal. Who were the invitees? Was it Cardinals and Bishops from the church? Celebrated local dignitaries? No, it was the people cared for by the local Caritas (meaning charity or love) church charity and their volunteers. Refugees, homeless and poor people were the guests of honor along with those who care for them.

"In the church, Pope Leo said, "everyone is poor and precious, and all share the same dignity. (And) I encourage you not to distinguish between those who assist and those who are assisted, between those who seem to give and those who seem to receive, between those who appear poor and those who feel they have something to offer in terms of time, skills and help."

Whether any of us who identify as Christians also identify with a particular denomination, either as a Protestant or Roman Catholic, are we able to hear and receive this message being shared and use it to inspire and then transform our actions here at St. Paul's? Can each of us as members of the church truly work toward being the holy catholic (universal) Church? What about those of us who approach God in a different way, perhaps Jewish, or Universalist, or Buddhist? What about those of us who live lives of compassion without a stated belief system? Can we continue to act on this message to tear barriers and walls down between ourselves and give and receive as we are able? I truly hope so.








We are proud to honor Mr. Gus Kostas as our Resident of the Month on Willows B


