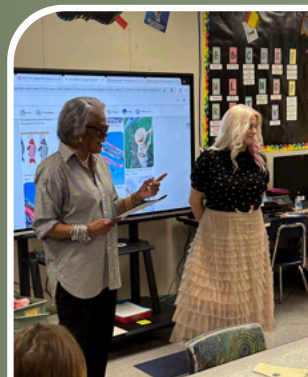

A Message From Our Chairman and President



As we reflect on 2025, we are filled with gratitude and pride for the remarkable progress our Foundation and community achieved together. This year was defined by meaningful growth, deepened community engagement, and a renewed commitment to building a stronger, more connected Washington County.

The Foundation created intentional spaces for dialogue, collaboration, and learning. Donors, nonprofit leaders, and community members united to strengthen relationships and inspire new ideas. Around the Giving Table, a new lunch-and-learn series, was launched to create informal, meaningful conversations about philanthropy and the many ways thoughtful giving strengthens Washington County.

Educational opportunities for charitable organizations were also expanded through the Nonprofit Learning & Education (NPLE) series, equipping nonprofit leaders with practical tools, professional development, and valuable peer connections to strengthen their missions and long-term sustainability.

Our commitment to informed decision-making continued through CommunitySnapshot.org, which remains an important resource for understanding local needs and opportunities. As engagement with the platform grows, Community Snapshot will continue to influence data-driven decisions, helping donors, nonprofits, and community leaders align resources where they can make the greatest difference.

One of the defining themes of 2025 was grantmaking, which reflected both immediate community needs and the broader vision shaping the Foundation's future strategic plan.

These efforts were informed by the voices, priorities, and aspirations of our community and helped strengthen long-term impact across Washington County. This impact was further amplified through donor engagement and initiatives such as the Close to Home Fund, which continues to support rapid-response grantmaking and strengthen the sense of community-centered philanthropy across our area.

A major highlight of the year was WCCF Gives, which reached a significant milestone. The seven-week campaign engaged thousands of donors who made over 6,000 gift designations, raising more than \$1.9 million in support of 153 local charities. This represents a 7% increase over the previous year and marks the highest number of gift designations in the program's history. Importantly, all funds raised through WCCF Gives are distributed as unrestricted grants, providing critical flexibility for nonprofits to meet their most pressing needs, from rising operational costs to increased demand for services, at a time when that flexibility is especially vital.

Today, we are energized by the momentum we have built and optimistic about the future ahead. Supported by the dedication of our Board, staff, donors, nonprofit partners, and community members, the Washington County Community Foundation is well positioned to continue advancing thoughtful philanthropy and meaningful impact.

Thank you for being part of this important work. Your trust, partnership, and shared commitment make our collective impact possible.

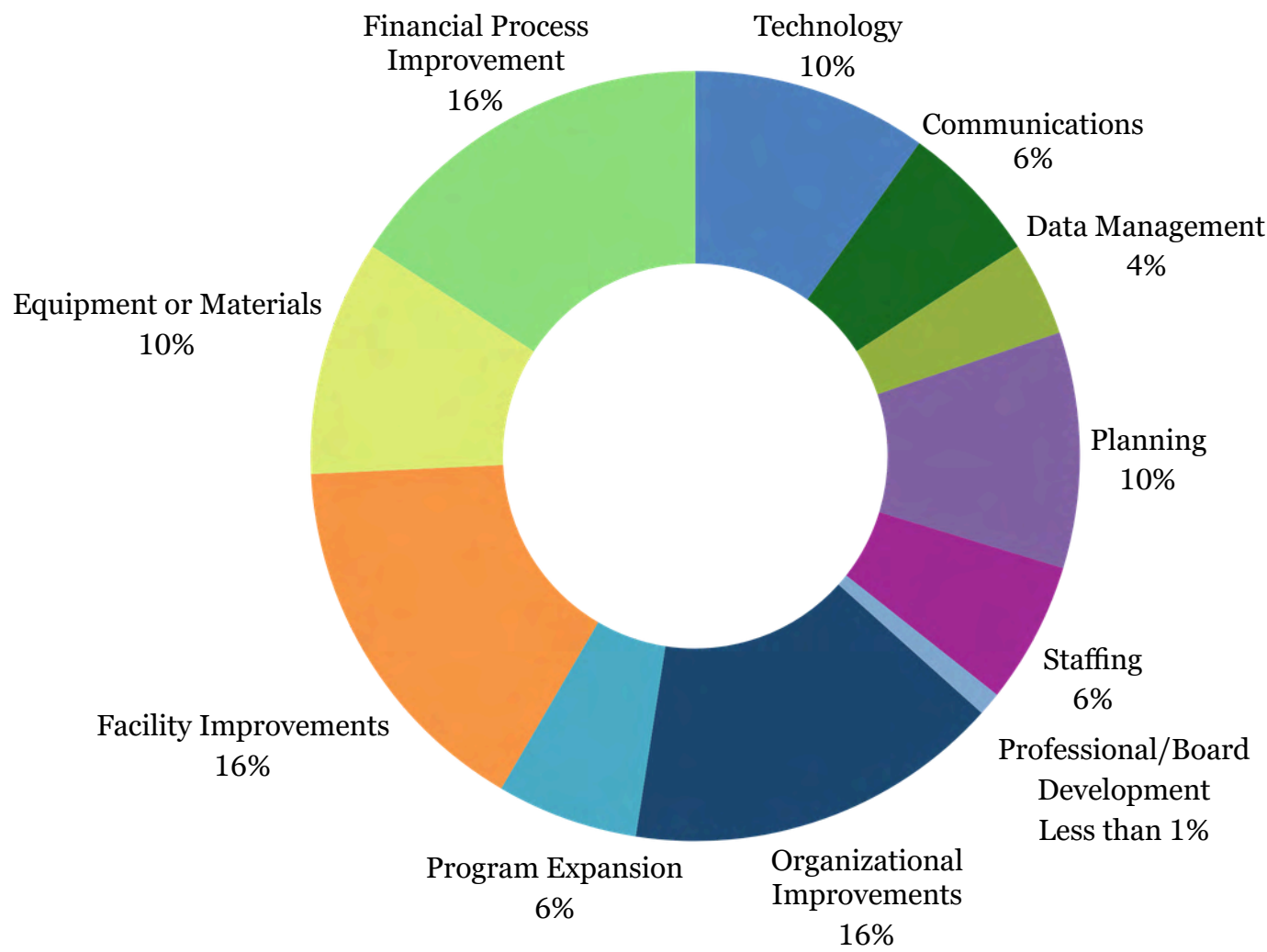

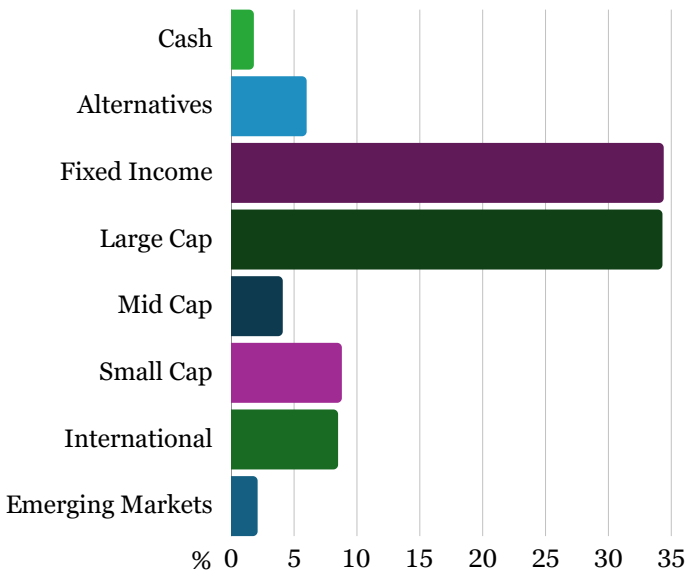

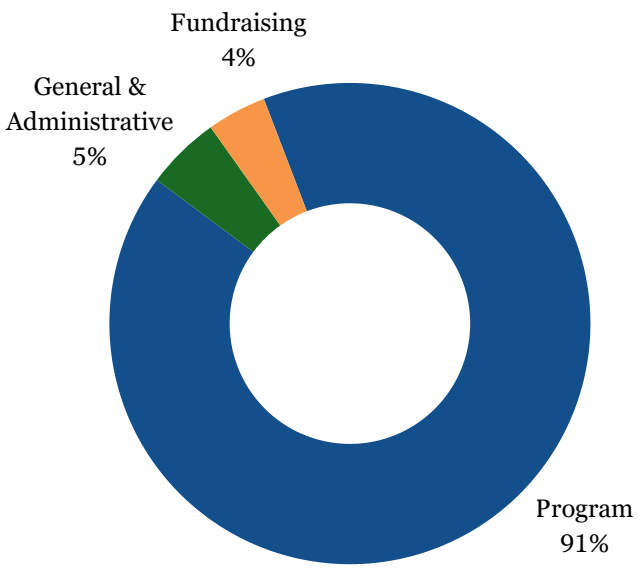
2025 CAPACITY-BUILDING GRANTS



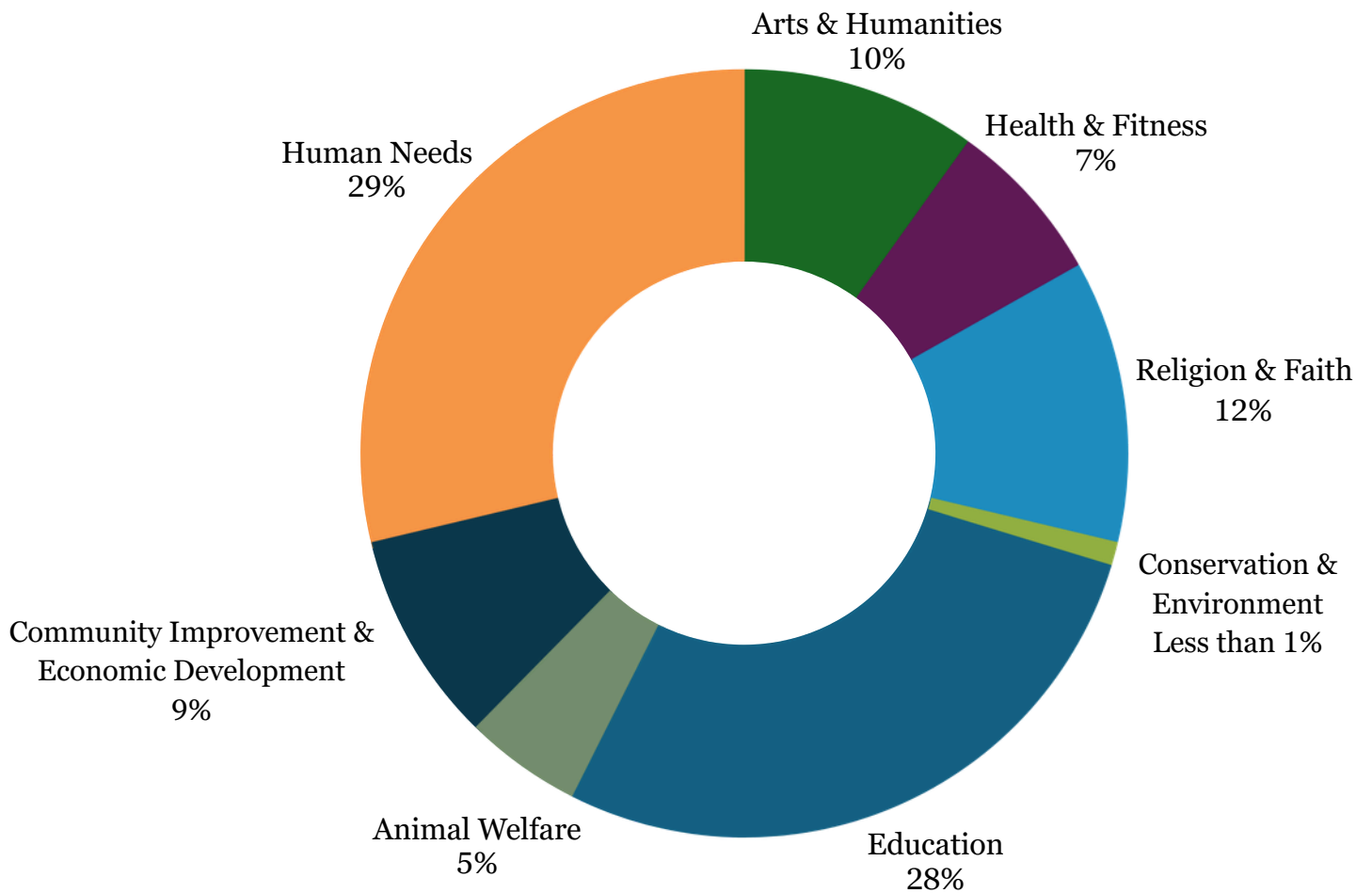
INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO COMPARISON



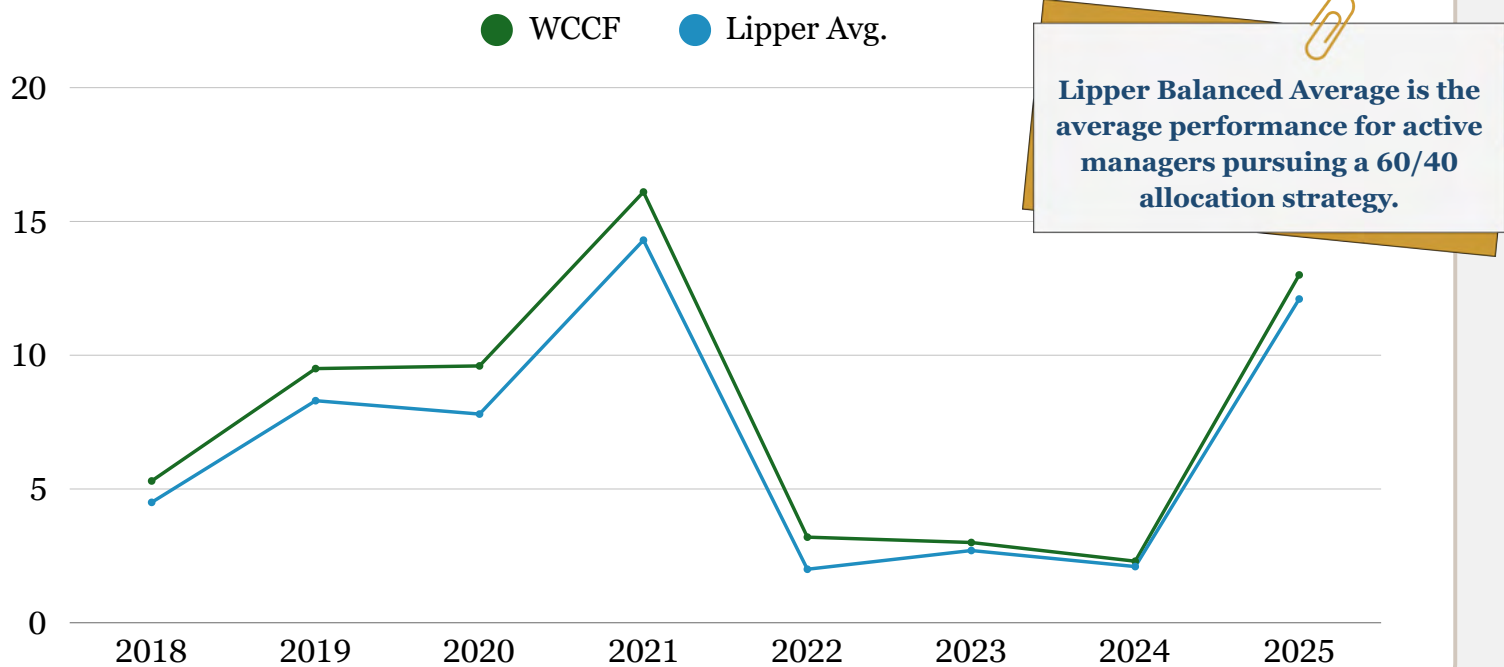
2025 FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

Grantmaking Impact

In 2025, thanks to the generosity of our donors and the leadership of our Board of Trustees, the Foundation experienced a high level of grantmaking, with meaningful progress already taking place across the community. As we move forward, we remain committed to strategic, data-informed philanthropy guided by community insight and tools such as CommunitySnapshot.org to ensure our resources are aligned with the areas of greatest need and opportunity.



Sharing the Story: Beverly's Birthdays Expands Its Reach

A \$10,000 grant was awarded to **Beverly's Birthdays** to strengthen its marketing and communications and expand its reach in Washington County. With improved outreach and messaging, more families will be able to access services such as baby showers, infant supplies, and essential resources. This effort will also increase local awareness and donor support, helping ensure the organization can continue to grow and meet rising demand while bringing support, stability, and joy to families across the community.

Feeding Community Connections: 412 Food Rescue Outreach Expansion

A \$10,000 grant strengthened **412 Food Rescue's** targeted marketing and communications efforts in Washington County, helping expand awareness of food rescue work and strengthen connections between surplus food and local organizations in need. This investment helps broaden outreach, improve community engagement, and increase the organization's capacity to reduce food waste while serving more individuals and families across the region.



Training the Next Generation: W&J Advances Nursing Education

With a \$15,000 grant, **Washington & Jefferson College** added an Anatmage Table to enhance its nursing program. This advanced 3D technology allows students to explore and virtually dissect the human body, which improves hands-on learning and prepares them for real-world care. As the program grows in partnership with UPMC Washington, this investment is helping build a pipeline of skilled nurses to meet critical healthcare needs in Washington County.



Setting the Stage for Success: Canonsburg Theatre Planning



Canonsburg Educational and Cultural Institute received a \$20,000 grant to help complete a comprehensive economic impact study for a proposed theatre at the former Canonsburg Middle School. The study, conducted with Custom Consulting, outlines the project's anticipated benefits, including job creation, increased local earnings, and expanded tax revenues, and provides a strong, data-driven foundation to support future development and fundraising efforts.

Strengthening Senior Services: Center in the Woods Upgrades Technology

A \$10,000 grant supported **Center in the Woods** in upgrading its computer systems to improve financial management, data reporting, and operational efficiency. The investment replaced outdated equipment and strengthened secure data tracking and reporting, ensuring the organization can continue delivering high-quality programs that support active, independent living for older adults in Southwestern Pennsylvania.

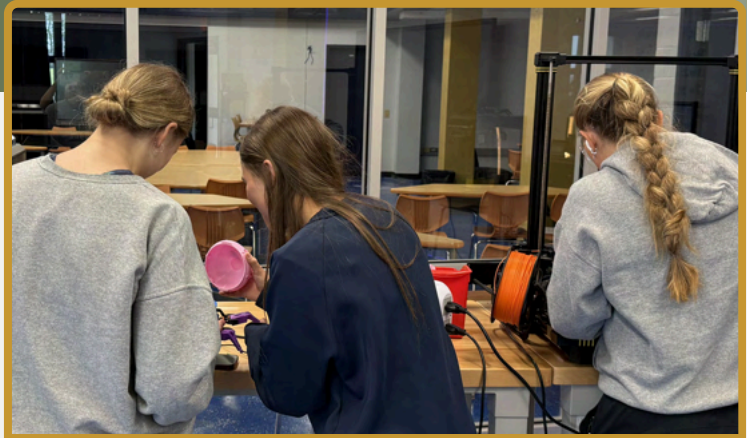

In 2025, the ***Range Resources School District Enrichment Fund*** was established to support academic programming, classroom improvements, educational supplies, and other resources that enhance learning opportunities for local students.

The company also established the ***Range Resources Municipal Enrichment Fund***, supported by a \$50,000 commitment, to provide assistance to qualified townships with well sites in their jurisdiction. Grants from the fund may support continuing education for municipal staff, office upgrades, IT equipment, and other resources that help local governments better serve their residents.

The two new funds build on Range Resources' long-standing commitment to community investment. In 2018, the company established the ***Range Resources Good Neighbors Fund***, which has awarded a total of nearly \$1.5 million to fire departments and emergency management organizations. With the addition of the School District Enrichment Fund and Municipal Enrichment Fund, Range Resources is expanding its support to the schools, local governments, and public institutions that help our communities thrive.

Strengthening Community Connections



The Community PILLARS certificate program was created to strengthen the governance of local charities through six sessions aligned with accreditation standards from the **Pennsylvania Association of Nonprofit Organizations**. The curriculum addresses industry best practices across the charitable sector.

Thanks to the in-kind support of expert presenters, the Foundation is able to offer this comprehensive training at no cost to participants.

Since 2023, 42 individuals have graduated from Community PILLARS.



As part of the NPLE educational speaker series, the Foundation hosted a public relations workshop presented by **Krakoff Communications** at **Core Natural Resources**. The session brought together representatives from local charities to strengthen communication strategies and enhance community outreach efforts.



Building on the success of our charity education series, we expanded our programming to further engage community members committed to improving quality of life in Washington County. "Around the Giving Table" explores the work of the Foundation while highlighting charitable giving strategies that help donors maximize their community impact.

Close to Home Disaster & Emergency Fund

The **Close to Home Disaster & Emergency Fund** provides grants to human service organizations serving Washington County, Pennsylvania, in response to local disasters and emergencies that create urgent, unanticipated community needs.

The segment of our community that is most impacted during disasters and emergencies is the financially distressed, who already rely on the services of human services organizations. During disasters and emergencies, human services organizations are called upon to provide additional services, taxing their limited financial resources.

A total of \$747,000 was issued from the **Close to Home Disaster & Emergency Fund** in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. And in November 2025, a new crisis emerged.

The prolonged state and federal budget impasse created an acute emergency in Washington County, Pennsylvania. While government funding remained frozen and critical social service programs faced disruption or suspension, our most vulnerable community members experienced immediate hardship.

Our Response +

With the limited funding that was available, the Foundation was able to deploy **Close to Home** grants totaling \$23,500 to Food Helpers, Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank (exclusively for the Washington County pantries), Southwestern Pennsylvania Area Agency on Aging, and AMI in support of emergency food assistance. While these grants provided some critical bridge funding, they also revealed a sobering reality: **Without a robust emergency fund in place, our capacity to respond is severely limited.**

We are honored to recognize the 2025 award recipients for their exceptional leadership, service, and commitment to strengthening our community.



A. Charles C. Keller Excellence Award for Corporate Philanthropy

Founded by Jim and Ellen Hough in 2016, **Liberty Pole Spirits** has become a fixture in both Washington County's business and nonprofit communities. Inspired by the region's history, the Hough family built their distillery around traditional whiskey-making methods while fostering a strong culture of community involvement. Through volunteer leadership, support for local organizations, and partnerships with community events and fundraisers, Liberty Pole Spirits has made a lasting impact far beyond the spirits they produce.

B. Dr. Howard Jack Outstanding Public Educator Award

Bethlehem-Center School District Art Teacher **Sherrie' Rodriguez** brings creativity, encouragement, and heart into her classroom every day. Inspired by her own love of art and time volunteering in her children's school, she returned to school to become an art educator and help students learn through creativity and expression. Whether guiding students through new skills or helping them find confidence in their work, she creates a space where every child feels seen and capable. For her, teaching is about helping students discover what they love and connecting it to how they learn.

2025 Honorees

C. Louis E. Waller Humanitarian Award

Arthur Keys has dedicated his life to humanitarian work, faith, and community service, both around the world and in Washington County. After leading international development efforts across dozens of countries, he returned home and continued advocating for underserved communities through housing, ministry, and local outreach. Guided by compassion and a belief in the common good, Arthur approaches every challenge with optimism and a commitment to helping others.

D. Northrop Family Excellence Award for Community Philanthropy

Dennis (Dink) and Mary Lea Dutton have devoted their lives to Washington County through deep connections to family, land, and community. From dairy farming and insurance to education and local service, their work has always centered on giving back. Through scholarships, fair programs, and charitable funds, they have strengthened opportunities for others across the county. Guided by a belief in service and connection, they continue to quietly shape and support the community they call home.

E. President's Silver Award

The **Bradford House Historical Association (BHHA)** preserves the National Historic Landmark Bradford House Museum and shares the history of the Whiskey Rebellion and 18th-century life. Founded in 1965, the organization has grown from a single historic home into a multi-site operation that includes the Whiskey Rebellion Education and Visitor Center and the Meeting House. The \$25,000 grant from the award will support continued program expansion and help prepare for additional space to accommodate growing educational and community offerings.

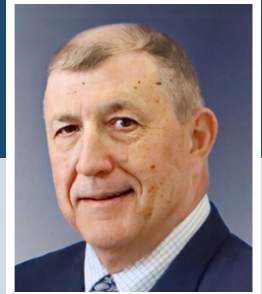

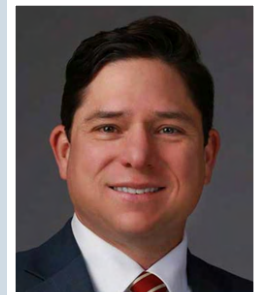

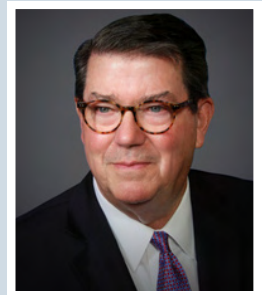
