St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age. Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

A Message from Chaplain Pat

When we think of August perhaps you think of the last few weeks to get to the lake, or the anticipation of even more sweltering temperatures, although we are having an unseasonably cool respite right now, or how little time to prepare for the too short autumn with the possibility of early snow, maybe that is just me. Did you know the other thing August is known for is this is the time when meteor showers are most easily seen in the pre-dawn hours in the northern sky?

The Perseid meteor shower has been enthralling folks who have been up early enough to notice for a couple of thousand of years now. They are noticeable in the sky from July 23 to August 22 but the peak viewing will be Aug. 11-12. The meteor showers we see are the remnants of the debris from a comet that the earth is passing through in its travel. I always think of any meteorites as events we experience when we look up without ever thinking that at times they may have entered our atmosphere and have come down. Until a trip to Oklahoma.

My family and I traveled from Texas many years ago to bury my cousin on the Sac-n-Fox Indian Reservation located in a small town called Stroud, OK. There are many rituals around burial which takes place over a six day period. There was one restaurant in Stroud, conveniently located near the one nice motel where we would meet extended family for breakfast who were familiar with the area and helping us navigate through the burial process in an unfamiliar culture. One morning I was asked if we were going to visit Meteorite Creek while we were here. After receiving more information about the many large meteorites that fell outside of town, and that they were supposed to have healing properties, point the way!

One man, where many large meteors fell, opened his land for any travelers to visit and spend some time. They were very large, not altogether different than big, grey rocks and they were arranged in a general circle. My cousins and I took our turns sampling each meteor for its warmth or cooling properties (it is very hot in OK), how comfortable to sit or lay on them (turns out very comfortable), and any texture differences in how they feel (they were the same). We spent the afternoon there and it was a healing time, not interrupted by the sound of words only the song of the birds in the surrounding trees.

When we are open to the possibility of God working in the world through large (miracles) and small ways we are opening ourselves to recognizing God's providence, how God provides, which comes in many ways and forms. God uses all God has created to be in relationship with us. Then we can choose for ourselves how we wish to be in relationship with God.

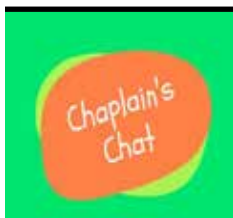

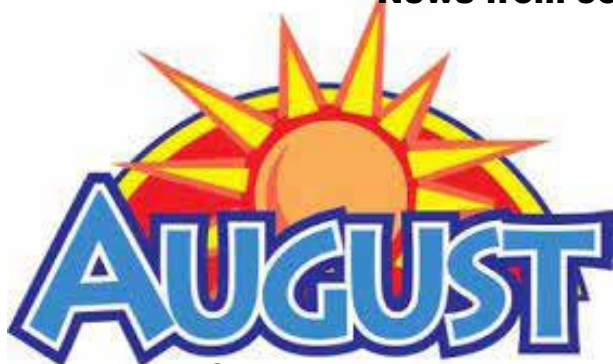

From a young age, Justice knew she wanted to help others. She fondly remembers accompanying her grandmother each day as she cared for a family friend who was a quadriplegic. Those experiences left a lasting impression.

Justice credits that time with teaching her the importance of love, patience, and perspective. "He gave my grandmother the nickname 'Happy,'" she recalled. He also taught her an invaluable life lesson—to make the most of difficult situations. "We tend to forget what we have and instead focus on the things we lose," Justice said. "It's always important to realize what we have left." She also cherishes the special bond that developed between her grandmother and their friend. "It became a true friendship," she said.

Inspired by those early experiences, Justice always felt called to nursing. After her high school sweetheart decided to move to Greenville, she followed after graduation, explored educational opportunities at Thiel College, and enrolled in the nursing program.

Even before starting school, Justice discovered St. Paul's Home-Based Services while researching employment opportunities on Indeed. "My mom was a C.N.A.—actually, many of my aunts were C.N.A.s," Justice said. Confident that she could make a difference, she joined the team. Now, two years later, she reflects on her experience with gratitude.

"It's definitely give-and-take," she said. "I pour love into their cup, and they pour love back into mine."

Growing up, Justice realized that not everyone has family or friends available to provide care and companionship. "I like to be that person," she said. "It fills a void for them."

One of the things Justice appreciates most about working in Home-Based Services is the meaningful relationships she has built with her clients and the

wisdom they share. "I learn so many life lessons from them," she said.

She especially remembers one of her very first—and longest-term—clients. "She gave me so much advice. She was genuinely interested in my life—what I was doing and what I was thinking. As a nurse, she even helped me with my homework!"

Justice said it is often the small moments that mean the most. "My clients can tell when I'm low on energy," she said. "They're always quick to offer a hug or an encouraging word. Hearing that affirmation—that I'm good at my job and a good person—really means a lot."

As a Care Partner, Justice values the close connections she forms with those she serves. "You become very involved in your clients' lives," she explained. "When I share parts of my own life and struggles, it helps them feel more comfortable opening up to me."

Her philosophy is simple: "Age is irrelevant. We're all human."

Although she originally pursued nursing, Justice has recently shifted her educational focus to business. "I hope to own my own business someday," she said.

Outside of work, Justice enjoys spending time with her two cats, Jisu and Sassy. She loves listening to music—especially '90s R&B—shopping, painting, and making bracelets. She also enjoys watching her favorite television shows, Love Island and Grey's Anatomy.

When asked about her dream vacation, her answer came without hesitation. "Hawaii! I've wanted to go there since I was nine years old. I want to see the beautiful blue water, relax on the beaches, and enjoy fresh coconuts."
