## St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age. Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

# Spiritual Services

## A Message from Chaplain Pat

*We The People — We The People — We The People*

Moving quickly towards our Nation's 250th anniversary, the phrase, **We The People** has been very much on my mind and heart. This year is the 250th signing of the Declaration of Independence, that announced the 13 American colonies were separating from Great Britain to become sovereign states. **We The People** is the first three words of the United States Constitution, establishing the structure of the federal government, and is itself the supreme law of the land. The Constitution has been amended 27 times to adapt to a growing nation's needs. Serving two different functions, these two documents are interconnected.

**We The People.** The Declaration gives us unalienable rights, meaning impossible to take away, surrender or transfer to another person, such as life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. The Constitution gives us separation of powers, checks & balances, the Bill of Rights. These defined how living without a Monarch, or sovereign leader would take form.

**We The People.** In many of my sermons I have teaching points to understand the counter-cultural and radical leadership of Jesus as the Christ against the sovereign ruler of his time, the Roman Emperor. When Jesus is referred to as "Lord," it is a direct affront to the Romans, acknowledging the Emperor is not Lord. Jesus' fight was against the oppression of Roman rule with few rights. He was in conflict with religious leaders of his faith tradition. All because of Jesus' focus on the people. He showed how in oppression, conflicts with the government, fighting for basic sustenance, his people could find life and live it to its fullest. This would bring about a liberty they could not conceive of obtaining on their own.

Many of us here at St. Paul's are learning and growing into what it means to be **We The People** here in this bubble of safety, whether that is our physical, emotional or spiritual safety in our country that appears more divisible rather than indivisible than ever before. We are moving back to the radical compassion and loving-kindness Jesus is offering to all the people, for those who do not have the same faith tradition, or come from the same country, or even those considered enemies of his people. He did this without labels, without separation, without exclusion.

As we reflect on how our lives have been shaped by these two foundational documents, may we take our grounding in God's Justice and Love, learned either from Jesus as the Christ, or perhaps by other means, to remember that **We The People** means everyone.

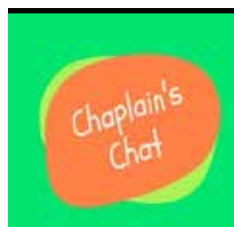

## Team Member Spotlight

She started slowly, building her confidence one client at a time. Today, Carol serves nine clients and does her best to accommodate their needs whenever possible.

Each caregiver has their own strengths, but Carol especially enjoys welcoming new clients. Laughing, she said, “It's like a box of chocolates—I never know who I'm going to meet next!”

“This job has really brought me out of my shell,” Carol shared. “I needed this job for my well-being.” She loves feeling useful and making a difference in the lives of others. “I love what I'm doing and helping people. Everyone is wonderful. Sometimes I feel like I can't do enough for them!” she said. Carol also enjoys being out in the community and building meaningful relationships with those

she serves.

In her spare time, Carol enjoys reading murder mysteries, visiting flea markets, and spending time in the kitchen cooking and baking. She and Dave share their home with two orange-and-white cats, Otis and Snoopy. Carol also once enjoyed horseback riding and riding Harley-Davidson motorcycles.

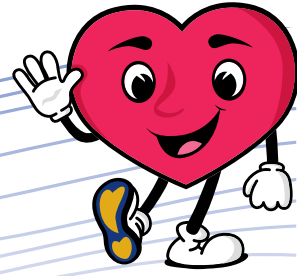
