During National Skilled Nursing Care Week, we embraced the theme “Moments in Bloom” in a truly meaningful way.

St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age. Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

Summer Solstice

June is the month for Summer Solstice, this year it falls on June 21, the same the world over. Summer Solstice is the longest day or longest period of sunlight of the year in the Northern Hemisphere.

For many thousands of years, it has been celebrated globally as a turning point in nature since it signifies the peak of the sun's power, the triumph of light, fertility and renewal, often inspiring traditional festivals and community gatherings. It is thought that summer solstice is related to timings of crop cycles, marking mid-summer for many regions and communities (National Trust).

Fire with the use of communal bonfires became a central celebratory event to help boost the sun's strength especially in Northern Nordic communities where there are such dramatic seasonal changes in the light of the year. In India, it marks the end of a six-month period when spiritual growth is the easiest. I found it interesting that this time frame also overlaps our Christian Season of Lent and Easter, a season that encourages that same spiritual growth.

Whether it is how we set our intention for spiritual growth, take our vacation time, have a firepit fellowship, plant items in our vegetable or perennial gardens, paint or practice photography, or are involved in animal husbandry, among other endeavors, our being revolves like the sun around the earth to the quality and quantity of light in our lives. Team Member Spotlight

be home to send her children off to school each morning and welcome them home each afternoon.

In her spare time, Jennifer's greatest joy is spending time with her children. She also enjoys contemporary Christian music and movies based on biblical prophecy. Her faith plays a central role in her life, and when time permits, she enjoys taking walks.

The Davis household is a lively one, with a beagle named Marshall, a cat named Clumsy, a parakeet, and several chickens and ducks.

When asked about her dream vacation, Jennifer quickly answered Japan. She and her husband were once nearly stationed there during his Navy career, but their orders were changed and they were sent to

California instead.

"I've always wondered what that would have been like," Jennifer said.

Jennifer finds tremendous satisfaction in her work, describing caregiving as both meaningful and rewarding.

"It gives me something purposeful to do during the day, and it also helps support my family financially," she said. "I really enjoy helping someone else and interacting with them."

She especially cherishes the moments when she and her clients can laugh and joke together and appreciates knowing that her efforts make a difference.

"I feel appreciated," Jennifer said. "I like hearing that I'm doing a good job."

For years, that familiar call echoed through the halls—usually followed by laughter and the quick shuffle of staff in pursuit. Our 26-year-old African Grey has always had a personality larger than life, and when he made his great escapes, he did so with flair. Darting after shoes, dodging his “rescuers,” and clearly enjoying every moment, Jonah kept everyone on their toes with his playful antics.

In recent years, especially since the changes brought on by COVID in 2020, Jonah spent more time in his enclosure. Naturally curious and full of energy, he made the most of any chance to explore—sometimes a little too creatively. Walls, baseboards—even parts of his own cage—became his “projects,” and it became clear: Jonah needed more space, more stimulation, and a safer environment to match his lively spirit.

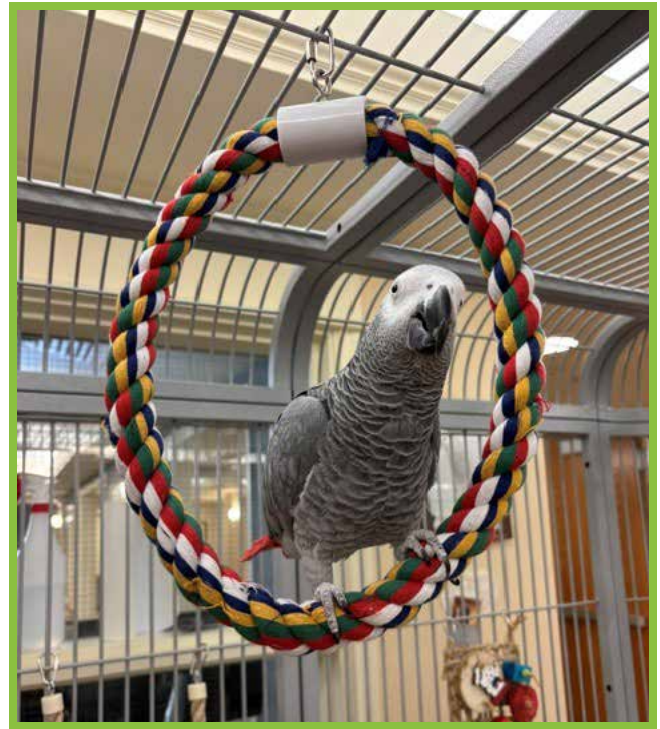
With guidance from his veterinarian, a healthier diet, and a renewed focus on enrichment, Jonah began to show even more energy and personality. So our team got to work. What started as a conversation turned into a plan that has been more than a year in the making—researching, learning, and thoughtfully designing a space that would truly feel like home.

That vision is now a reality. Jonah has moved into his very own 7-foot by 5-foot walk-in aviary—a spacious “mansion” complete with ropes, ladders, perches, and plenty of toys to keep him engaged and safe. The area itself was reimagined from the ground up: carpeting was removed and replaced with a washable, bird-friendly flooring, creating a clean, comfortable space large enough for Jonah to have his own private aviary.

This project truly took a community. Thank you to our Pet Committee for getting things started, Administration for their support and approval, our Grounds crew for transporting everything into place, and our Maintenance team for putting it all together.

And the best part? We’re seeing the return of the Jonah we all know and love—the whistling, talking, dancing, spirited companion who brings joy to everyone he meets. Now, he can roam freely within his aviary all day long, safe from busy foot traffic but still close enough for residents and staff to enjoy his antics up close.

If you find yourself near Willows B, be sure to stop by and say hello. Jonah just might greet you with a whistle—or even a dance. Welcome home, Jonah!

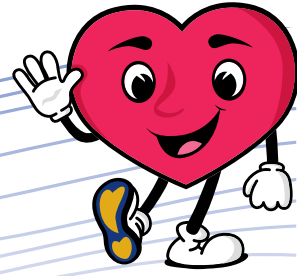
