

A Day on the Lake to Remember

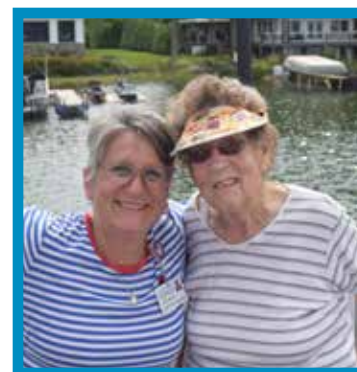

St. Paul's "Pet to Work" Policy

- As part of the Eden Alternative Philosophy, St. Paul's shall allow staff to bring appropriately trained pets to work with prior approval.
- Permission must be obtained from the Administrator or a member of the Pet Committee.
- If sharing workspace with other staff, those staff must be agreeable.
- Copies of vaccination records (including rabies and distemper) and licenses (if applicable) must be provided to the Administration office annually.
- It is recommended that pets be over 6 months of age. Please trial your pet during off-duty visits prior to bringing to work.
- Sick pets must remain at home.
- Pets must be on a non-retractable leash at all times. Failure to obey the leash rules may result in your pet being banned.
- Pets must be supervised at all times, otherwise they should be tied up or kept in a crate in a secure location.
- Pets are not permitted in areas where food is prepared, stored, dining rooms during meal times, or clean storage areas.
- Residents have the right to refuse pets in their rooms, please obey the residents' wishes.
- Pet breaks should coincide with staff breaks if at all possible.
- Pets should be appropriately trained. Excessive noise, jumping, damage to property or disruption of staff duties will not be tolerated. Pet owners are responsible for any damages that may occur.
- Owners are responsible for any and all clean up of their pet, inside and outside of the facility. Excessive soiling or damage to flooring will not be tolerated. If your pet soils the floor inside, please clean it up immediately. Carpet spot cleaning is the responsibility of the pet owner, not housekeeping.
- Infection control measures, such as hand hygiene, will be followed by residents and staff when handling animals.
- If work declines, the pet's visitation will be discontinued.
- Animals and types of animals will be selected carefully to meet the needs of residents.
- St. Paul's reserves the right to discontinue a pet's visitation at any time.

Spiritual Services

A Message from Chaplain Pat

September is the time for harvest. A time when all of the work through the previous year comes to fruition with hopeful, expected success and a good harvest to carry us through the next year. For those who are not gardeners, we plan the projects in Winter, prepare the soil in Fall the year before or early Spring, plant the seeds, add water and nutrients, tend and nurture the plants, let the earth, rain and sun do their jobs, harvest the produce when it is ready, be nourished by it, store some for Winter and then use the plant remnants in the soil to enrich it for the next year.

Well from a Spiritual perspective, can we have a spiritual harvest? The Bible and many other religions use the cycle of gardening with lots of analogies of harvesting. Some of those are understood as "growing the church" or attracting new members. What if we thought about it first, individually for our own spiritual journey and then collectively on how we work, live and play within community?

Defining what gives us meaning and purpose is preparing the soil of our spiritual journey. Adding some amendments to enrich the soil is determining and naming our version of God. For example, God is Love. This is our filter through which we sift everything we encounter. When we look for and experience all the ways God works through our lives and the world around us, this is like the plants receiving wind, rain, soil and sun. Does this mean that our lives are now going to be perfect? Not at all. It's called a spiritual journey for a reason!

When the winds are too harsh, or we are going through a drought or feel the need for a bit shade when we feel overwhelmed, this is when we act. We participate in acts of kindness, random acts of beauty, prayer, meditation, stillness in nature, attending worship, whatever works for you, to provide the nurturing we need to thrive. This is also the structure that is the framework throughout all the seasons of our lives.

Spiritually our harvest is when we experience abundance. Is it the overriding but very vulnerable sensation of feeling compassion for others? Is it being joy-filled or peace-filled? Perhaps it's when others see or we experience the fruition, the fruits of all of our labors that we have taken to get to this point. We prepare ourselves though, knowing this is not sustainable. There will be setbacks and disappointments. Autumn always leads to Winter. If we get used to living within the seasons, we go back to our spiritual practices that make up our framework and after resting and healing, we begin again.

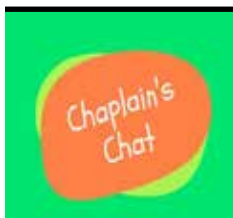

Team Member Spotlight

Kristin Emmett was born in Tampa, Fla., but moved to Pennsylvania at age 13 to live with her father. The oldest of three children, she has one brother and one sister.

After graduating from Mercer High School, Kristin attended Slippery Rock University, where she studied journalism and communications for two years. Realizing that field wasn't her passion, she changed course and spent seven years working at Elephant Castle, first as a cook and later in management. She also worked at the Iron Bridge Inn in Mercer.

When Kristin and her husband welcomed their son, Nolan, she stepped away from the workforce for 16 years to focus on raising him.

A defining moment in Kristin's life came when her mother was diagnosed with end-stage liver disease and admitted to hospice. Kristin became her mother's full-time caregiver.

"I had taken the C.N.A. course when I attended Vo-Tech in high school, and I also attended some nursing classes at Sharon Regional Hospital," Kristin recalled.

One particular moment during her mother's care has stayed with her. While Kristin was washing her mother's hair, her mom told her, "You are good at this." When Kristin assumed she was referring to washing her hair, her mother clarified, "I don't mean the hair—I mean you are good at taking care of people."

Those words stayed with Kristin.

After her mother passed away, Kristin felt ready to return to work. "As I was deciding what type of work I wanted to do, I remembered what my mom said to me. So I started looking on Indeed and applied at St. Paul's!" she said.

She was quickly contacted for an interview with Home-Based Services and soon joined the team.

In the six short months Kristin has been with Home-Based Services, she has proven to be a natural fit and a quick study. She has already grown her client base to eight individuals.

"No two clients are ever the same," Kristin said. "They each come from a different walk of life, and each has their own needs and personalities. Every client has been so welcoming!"

What Kristin appreciates most about her work is getting to know her clients and building meaningful connections with them.

"I understand that it is hard to ask for help. My job

is to build a connection with them. It is not a business transaction—I am just another human here to help! They always have the power to direct their care and tell me what they want and what they don't want. I think that helps them relax," she explained.

The biggest challenge, Kristin said, is "not knowing what I'm walking into." Some clients have very specific expectations, while others are more comfortable allowing her to take the lead. Kristin has demonstrated a special ability to adapt to each situation, often serving as the first caregiver for many new Home-Based Services clients. She approaches each individual with sensitivity, patience, and professionalism.

Outside of work, Kristin describes herself as an avid reader, especially

enjoying what she calls "romantasy"—a combination of romance and fantasy. She has also enjoyed playing golf for the past 20 years and loves art, particularly drawing and painting.

Kristin is a devoted pet owner. She has three cats—Zoe, Grizzley, and Malificent, affectionately known as "Mal." Two of her cats are rescues from Strayhaven. She also has a chocolate Labrador named Maddie.

If she could take a dream vacation anywhere, Kristin would love to visit Scotland. She is fascinated by the country's heritage and has especially enjoyed the *Outlander* series of books, which is set in Scotland.

We often find that our personal experiences help shape and guide us in our careers. For Kristin, her desire to care for others began to take shape during her high school years. The difficult yet deeply meaningful experience of caring for her mother ultimately inspired Kristin to continue that calling by helping others through her work at St. Paul's and in the greater community.

We are grateful for Kristin and the compassion, sensitivity, and dedication she brings to those she serves each day.

When the final scores were tallied, the Blue Team came out on top, followed by the Red Team in second place and the White Team in third.

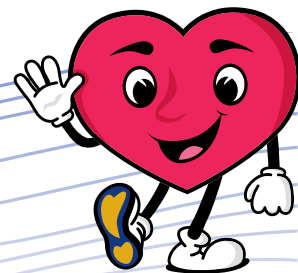

With decorated carts, plenty of smiles and residents cheering from along the route, the second annual parade was well worth the wait and another wonderful St. Paul's summer tradition.



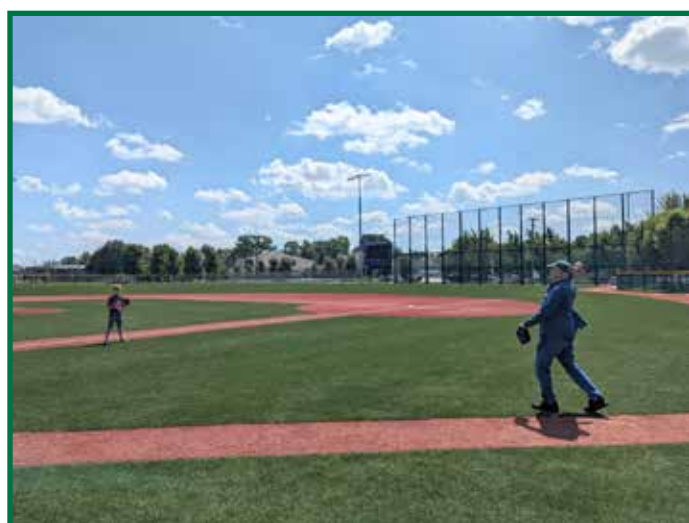
